# 2018 HSC RESULTS

Congratulations to our Year 12 students from 2018 who achieved some outstanding results in their Higher School Certificate exams at the end of last year. In all students at Deniliquin High School achieved 12 Band 6s (a score of 90+), 47 Band 5s (a score between 80 and 89). As a result of these strong results Pat Connell achieved an ATAR of 97.9 (placing him in the top 2% of all students in the state). Of our students who sat for the Higher School Certificate with the aim of going to University the vast majority received at least one offer.

These results reflect the hard work that these students put in as well as the many hours of support that they have received from the staff at the school. The dedication of all of the teachers over their 6 years at Deniliquin High School provided them with the opportunity and the skills that they needed to excel and their results reflect the quality education that have received during their time at Deniliquin High School.

# SWIMMING CARNIVAL

Last week we held another successful swimming carnival. It was great to see so many students participating and the house spirit that was shown by all of those in attendance was pleasing to see. # SPORTS LEVY

Deniliquin High School offers students a wide variety of sporting opportunities with the aim of developing sporting and social skills, improving health outcomes and establishing community links.

In order for the school to offer as wide a variety of sports as possible we ask parents to pay a sports levy each year. This levy offsets a small part of the costs associated with running sports including transportation and venue personnel. Information about this levy will be arriving in the mail soon. Students who do not pay the sport levy will be placed in free sports for 2019.

# **SCHOOL CONTRIBUTIONS**

Taking in to consideration the impact that the drought has had on our community the school has made some changes to voluntary contributions. To assist our families there is a 20% discount on contributions per child after the first child (e.g. child 1 pays 100% of contribution, child 2 pays 80%, and child 3 pays 60%). We have also waived elective contributions and placed a fix price for all students of \$130. We hope that this makes it a bit easier on families during this difficult time.

# ANTI-BULLYING PLAN

# WHAT IS BULLYING?

Bullying has three key features. It:

Involves a misuse of power in a relationship.

Is ongoing and repeated.

Involves behaviours that can cause harm.

Bullying can be physical, verbal, or social. Bullying can be easy to see (overt), or hidden (covert), such as spreading rumours about another person or excluding them.

Bullying can also happen online using technology such as the internet or mobile devices. This is known as online bullying or cyberbullying.

A person can be bullied about many different things such as how they look, sound or speak; their background, religion, race or culture including Aboriginality; having a disability; their sex; because they are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and/or intersex (LGBTI); their size or body shape or any other ways they may be different.

Some students are bullied about their academic or sporting achievements or hobbies.

#### WHAT BULLYING IS NOT

A single incident or disagreement between peers is not bullying. However, these behaviours may lead to bullying and should be resolved.

#### WHAT CAN I DO?

As a school, we encourage students to report any bullying to a staff member so that it can be followed up. The school also has boxes located within the school where students can anonymously report bullying that they have witnessed or been a victim of. The school runs a range of programs to support students and a copy of our Anti-Bullying Plan can be found on our website.

#### **ENGLISH NEWS**

Welcome back to another year of excellence at Deniliquin High School.

This year in English the focus of all units across Years 7-10 is on the textual concepts. Students will develop an understanding of: argument, authority, character, code and convention, connotation, imagery and symbol, context, genre, intertextuality, literary value, narrative, perspective, point of view, representation, style and theme. Students will demonstrate an understanding of these concepts through various learning processes such as; connecting, engaging critically, engaging personally, reflecting and experimenting. We are also moving to a more future-focused learning environment as students engage in more project-based learning units.

Year 12 have entered the second term of their HSC course and their first Module, while Year 11 are beginning their focus on Reading to Write. The importance of reading is emphasised across the curriculum and engagement in reading is a strong indicator of academic success. Therefore, if a student has no homework, it is certainly an expectation that they will read.

This year students will have the opportunity to experience theatrical performances as follows:

This visible learning strategy will ensure students see the value of their learning now and beyond the school context and be explicitly shown to be successful learners.

We encourage students to embrace the opportunities afforded to them throughout the year, including extra-curricular activities such as debating. Miss Johnson (debating co-ordinator) is seeking students who are interesting in participating in workshops held in Moama to develop student's skills needed for debating.

We are very pleased to welcome a new member of staff in the English Faculty this year. Miss Stirling has joined us from Sydney and is eager to bring new enthusiasm and ideas to support students in achieving excellence.

#### **CAREERS NEWS**

#### SENIOR PARENT TEACHER INFORMATION EVENING – WEDNESDAY 6<sup>TH</sup> MARCH

The first of our 2019 senior events kicks off on March 6<sup>th</sup> from 6pm. There will be two sessions running concurrently across the school on this evening. We will hold the Year 12 information session in the Library from 6pm to 6.45pm while the Year 11 students and parents are meeting with senior teachers in the MPC. After 6.45pm we will swap and Year 11 parents will discuss expectations etc.. for senior school and can return to the MPC to follow up any interviews they missed. We look forward to all parents attending where they can, so they can be well informed and armed for the months ahead.

#### YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

Year 10 students have been advised that a work experience block has been organised for Term Two from May 27 through to May 31. The expectation is that ALL students will participate in this compulsory school to work event. As explained to students, they are only limited by their imagination and their resources. Work experience is not a funded activity and the onus is on students to meet all associated costs of the experience. We are happy to discuss individual opportunities, but again, we incorporate opportunities for experiential students by empowering them, where possible, to make the personal approach as would be required of them in the adult world of work.

#### WHITE CARD

We are asking students who are interested in a trade for work experience to enlist in the White Card course which will be run in-house in the coming weeks. The cost will remain around \$50.00 and will be a one day in-school course, run by Anthony Bradley. Students are being asked to place their name on an Expression of Interest sheet outside the Careers Office over the coming weeks.

#### FISH PARK PROJECT 2019

The 2019 Fish Park Project was launched last week with the selection of the candidates who will work on the project this year. Mrs Denny will enjoy the company of 11 keen students from Year 10 to assist with the upgrade and maintenance of the town lagoon system in conjunction with our fabulous partners at Local Land Services Deniliquin, Yarkuwa Indigenous Knowledge Centre, Edward River Council, MIL, Edward Wakool Angling Association and Rice Growers Association. #### SRE

A special religious education (SRE) program will be beginning next week. Year 7 and Year 8 students will have the opportunity to participate in the program with Penny Fowler, a local church representative. This will be of a mainstream Christian ethos and occur once a week for 1 lesson. If you wish to withdraw your child from special religious education this can be done by completing and returning the SRE note tear-off slip to the Front Office. Students continue in the same arrangement each year, unless a parent/caregiver has requested a change in writing. At any time, you have the right to change your SRE nomination or to withdraw your child from the nominated lessons.

Students who do not participate in the SRE program will stay with their classroom teacher but no formal teaching of the curriculum will occur. Activities students could complete include assessment, homework tasks and silent reading.

Additional details of the SRE program on offer at the school can be obtained from the SRE provider Penny Fowler. Mr Tobin, Head Teacher HSIE, is the program co-ordinator.

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# Best Start Year 7 Assessment 2019

Information for parents and carers

Dear parents and carers

**Best Start Year 7** is a new online assessment for students that helps provide information for teachers on the literacy and numeracy skills of students at the beginning of Year 7.

The Best Start Year 7 will take place at our school in Term 1, 2019.

The assessment, covers key literacy and numeracy skills that are important to a student's success in all subjects in high school. Students come to high school with a range of experiences, skills and abilities in literacy and numeracy. It is important that teachers have current information about their students so that they can plan programs and lessons that best support the learning needs of every student.

The Best Start Year 7 Assessment will be completed at school during class time.

No preparation is needed for this assessment. Its purpose is to provide our teachers with additional information to best support the teaching of your child.
