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# PRINCIPAL MESSAGE

#### **COMBINED PUBLIC SCHOOL AND CATHOLIC SCHOOL INDUSTRIAL ACTION**

You may have seen on the news that the NSW Teachers Federation and the Independent Education Union of Australia will take joint strike action on Thursday 30 June following a joint meeting between the executive of the two organisations. Further information will be shared on the impact that this will have on our school.

#### ATTENDANCE AND ABSENCES

Parents of children from Kindergarten to Year 12 must ensure their children attend school every day. On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick or having an infectious disease
- · having an unavoidable medical appointment
- · being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstances e.g. attending a funeral.

Parents must provide an explanation for absences to the school within 7 days from the first day of any period of absence. Where an explanation has not been received within the 7-day timeframe, the school will record the absence as unjustified on the student's record.

Arriving at school and class on time:

- ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- · helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- gives students time to greet their friends before class
- reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

#### Anti-Racism

Racism and racist behaviour are not tolerated in NSW public schools. Everyone in a NSW government school – students, staff, parents, carers and community members – is expected to treat others fairly and with respect, and to behave in ways which do not promote racism in the school community.

With your support, we do the very best we can to ensure that our students feel safe and are able to reach their potential.

The Department of Education rejects all forms of racism and is committed to the elimination of all forms of racial discrimination in NSW public schools. The Department's Anti-Racism Policy aims to ensure that no student, employee, parent, carer or community member experiences racism within the school environment The policy asks all members of the school community to assist in countering racism by demonstrating respect for the cultural, linguistic and religious backgrounds of others, and by behaving in ways that promote acceptance and harmony in the school environment.

### **ENGLISH NEWS**

At the end of this term we will farewell Mrs Aileen Clear, who has been filling in whilst we waited for our new permanent staff to begin. Mrs Clear was also with us in 2016, and it is testament to the students and culture of the school that she was willing to help us out again. The English faculty wish her all the best and thank her for her hard work and dedication during this time.

This term Year 9 students have been studying drama. They have explored texts by the one and only Bard, William Shakespeare, as well as modern adaptations of these. Many classes have also looked at more contemporary dramatic texts. Students have enjoyed engaging with the conflict and themes within each of their plays. For their assessment, students were tasked with composing a narrative that explored a theme present in their classes play. Here are a few extracts from their work.

"What was once a kind soul, slowly but surely starts to deteriorate like a rose tree flourishing then withering away into nothingness. No longer does Rylor care about anyone or anything, it all means nothing. The only place where Rylor felt somewhat loved and accepted was at home but now there is nothing, nowhere and no one." – Tanaka

Year 7 have been finalising their Film Unit and creating storyboards on our new whiteboard desks. After they decide on elements of cinematography, including camera shots, angles and sound, they will be using the ipads to film a scene from their own scripts.



### DEBATING

This week, the DHS debating team, made up of students Grace Ball, Teddy Schofield, Tanaka Maunganidze, Erica Hayes, Scout McKenzie and Chelsea Flannigan, competed against West Wyalong High School. Deni High were the negative team, having to argue 'That the top students in every year group should have to tutor struggling students in their year.'

They talked about things like mental health, student stress levels, not having enough time and lacking the necessary qualifications. These arguments, in conjunction with their use of rhetoric, granted them



the win.

Last week, the Years 9 and 10 debating team, consisting of Tanaka Maunganidze, Grace Ball, Teddy Schofield, Erica Hayes, Chelsea Flannigan and Scout McKenzie, competed against Hay War Memorial High School in the second round of the Premier's Debating Challenge.

'That climate change policy should be determined by a panel of scientists instead of the government' was the topic selected for the debate.

After a lucky coin toss, DHS were named the affirmative team. Students developed a series of arguments relating to the fact that scientists are more educated in areas of climate change, and that these same politicians are more focused on generating money for the nation, rather than taking care of the environment

The two teams found out during the adjudication process that there was only one politician currently in parliament who has a science degree. It was after this that our students were named winners of the debate.

#### SUSTAINABILITY 2.2

This term in the Agriculture section of Sustainability Year 8 has been studying and working with animals. In The classroom, they have looked at animal products, breeds and why they have been developed and gathered data about animals at our school farm. When at the farm, students have undertaken a range of activities with our sheep, alpacas, poultry and cattle. This is to give them confidence and skills when working with farm animals. These include basic handling skills such as fitting a halter, feeding, drafting, weighing, administering animal health products, mustering and leading. This week we have sold the last of the lambs from 2021 and students have been monitoring their growth rates over time. New lambs are expected from early August.



We have six calves at the farm so far this year and the classes weigh them regularly and will use the information in an excel spreadsheet to graph and compare the growth rates of individual animals. This is one way in which sustainability is supporting key outcomes from a range of KLA's. Many students already have great skills in animal husbandry but some have not worked with animals at close range before. It is pleasing to see so many of them having new experiences and gaining confidence.



# **CULTURE PROJECT**

In our language classes this term, Kulken have been busy creating picture books using the local traditional language. We are planning on creating five different books, with the topics Counting, Animals, Around Country, Conversations and Family. Some students have already finished one book and are onto creating their second book! Once they are completed and printed, they will be given out to other schools to use in their own studies of culture.

#### **Additional notes**

Shoes - It is compulsory for all students from Year 7-12 to wear full leather shoes –shoes with 'holes in the top of them' or shoes that essentially only cover the toes are not acceptable. Shoes must have leather covered uppers as required by the Education Department for safety in all subjects.
 Hats - It is highly encouraged for all students from Year 7-12 to wear an appropriate cap/hat when involved in outside activities such as at the Ag farm or on any excursion or activity where there is a lot of outside activity.

□ In winter months, other layers underneath the jumper can be worn, although they cannot be visible

If there is a valid reason for your child not being able to wear the full school uniform, please write a note explaining the reason so your child can receive a uniform pass for that day. Please strongly encourage the wearing of correct uniform to ensure that notes are seldom required.
